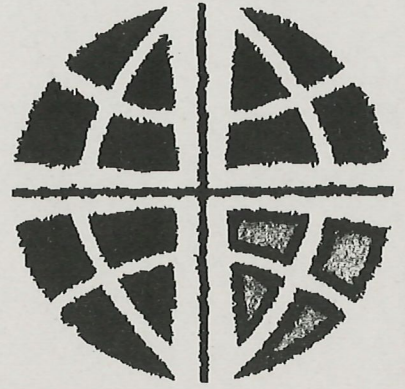

CALL TO ORDER: President Jennifer Wayne called the meeting to order at 10:08am. A quorum was met.

DEVOTIONS: Pastor Heidi Heimgartner introduced Evan Westphal who read the opening liturgy.

PASTOR'S REPORT AND STATISTICS: Pastor Heidi Heimgartner thanked our exec, board, and committee members, office staff and custodians, along with our many volunteers who make our church services happen and make our church The Welcome Place. She read the 2024 Statistics and pointed out how our church membership is trending younger.

REPORTS: President Jennifer Wayne directed church members to their packet for the different board and committee reports. Karla Iacovino came forward on behalf of the Worship and Music Committee to remind everyone that the Senior Choir isn't just for Seniors, any adult members are welcome to join.

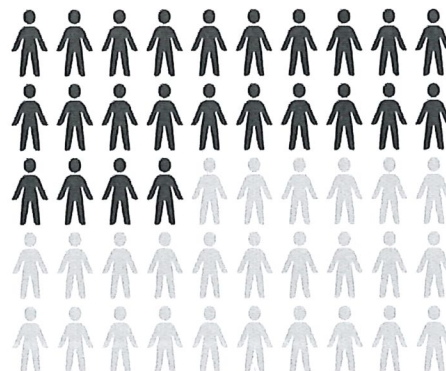

Overview of our decisions and efforts in 2025

- Phase 1 of the roof replacement project was completed by Malo Roofing Inc
 - Project was started June 6th and finished June 17th
 - Phase 1 included removing the rock ballast and EPDM membrane from over the Luther Rooms and the Education Wing
 - Lifting the large roof top air handler units and installing new unit bases
 - Added new 4.5" expanded polystyrene insulation
 - Replacing it with 60 mil EPDM membrane and return the rock ballast
 - Total Phase 1 expense was 182,722.25
- Phase 2 roof replacement project fundraising will start February of 2026
- Removed 19 trees from the property due to diseases.
 - Doug Ruhter and Paul Haberman took it upon themselves with help of others to remove them all
 - The plan is early spring of 2026 to have the stumps ground down and filled in with seed
 - Have not come up with a plan on replacing the trees with new ones.
- Removal and installed the pews when the hearing loop and new carpet was installed in the sanctuary and offices
 - Installers found asbestos in the front office. It was removed before the new carpet was installed
- Started to investigate the roof leak in the sanctuary.
 - Had a drone fly around the steeple and found some damage from a lightning strike.
 - Submitted to insurance company- They currently declined our claim.
 - Currently looking into different options to solve the situation

At the close of each meeting we reviewed and lifted up in prayer the prayer requests posted on the Prayer Concern Board located in the Sunday School Hall.

The Deacons enjoyed keeping the 22 Sunshine Bags full of fun things to help quietly entertain the young children attending our church services. We refreshed the Sunshine bags with new books and activity notebooks for each season.

On October 5th the Deacons helped Welcome 2 new families to First Lutheran Church at the New Member Sunday reception. We organized representatives of many of the Church Committees or groups to come and give a little introduction to what these committees and groups do at First Lutheran. We served bars, cookies and refreshments and visited with the new members and their families present. Three of the Deacons were present and provided the refreshments for the new members and their families.

On October 19th the Deacons hosted the Evening of Sharing for the 17 Confirmation students and their families. We provided refreshments for approximately 100 family and guests. One of our Deacons participated in reviewing the Confirmation Students' Faith Statements and participated with the confirmands as they shared their Faith Statements during the Evening of Sharing Service, with four of the Deacons participating.

For a second year, the Deacons helped distribute Thanksgiving and Christmas Dinner Meals to ten (10) families in need given by a Church members family to make the Holidays just a little bit brighter for those recipients.

First Lutheran Church had a Healing Service on December 21, 2025 10:30 am in the Fireside room. Pastor Laurel led the short service with five of the Deacons participating in the laying on of hands and offered quite care and support to those in attendance. About 20 people (10 guests) participated in the service, attendees were offered refreshments in the Fireside room. Pastor Laurel gave everyone in attendance a polished rock "Cross" to take with them. Refreshments were served by the Deacons.

First Lutheran Church - Parish Education Board - Annual Report 2025

The First Lutheran Parish Board of Education continues to follow the mission statement: "Gathering to learn God's word." Christian Education opportunities for students are planned and prepared by the Parish Education Board and the Director of Children's Ministry Tracy Madsen under the guidance of Pastor Heidi Heimgartner and Pastor Laurel Mester.

The members of the Parish Education Board for 2025 include: Devin Hines, Sam Hardecopf, Jacob Schwarz, Marcy Sundine, Mandy Trom and Heather Weber. The Board of Education meets once a month or as needed, and is overseen by Director Tracy Madsen

January 2025 Sunday School resumed after winter break on Jan 11th. 3rd grade students had their Bible Milestone class that day with Pastors and parents, followed by receiving their Bibles in worship January 25th. Children's offering that month was Hats and Gloves for BPES.

February 2025 All students participated in a Valentines party Feb 8th along with snacks, and bingo. Family, Friends and Fun Sunday took place on February 22nd for 3-year-old - 1st grade students with a snack. 3-year-old - 4th grade sang at 9am worship. Noisy Offering was collected for VBS through the Children's Offering.

March 2025 Students participated in Bible Buddies, teaming younger students with the older students in Sunday School. On April 13, students participated in the Palm Parade at the beginning of worship. We had over 90 students join for our annual Easter Egg Hunt that day. In addition, 5th graders had their First Communion Milestone class with parents and participated in making their own communion bread Palm Sunday evening. Children's offering in March was Peanut Butter for Steele County Pathways.

April 2025 Sunday School recognized the 14 students who participated in First Communion on Maundy Thursday, April 2nd. 6th grade students had a Confirmation preview with Pastor Heidi and Pastor Laurel, and Good Earth Village representatives visited to talk about camp and lead music time with students. Noisy Offering was collected this month for the Confirmation Summer Youth Trip.

May 2025 Time to celebrate memory work, thank our teachers, and look ahead to summer! Students ages 3-year-old - 4th grade sang in worship on May 3rd, which was also the last day of Sunday school. Weekly average for the Sept 2025-May 2026 Sunday School year was 80 students. Children's offering in May was noisy offering for Good Earth Village camperships.

June 2025 True North Vacation Bible School was held June 3, 4 and 5, 2-3:30pm each day. 70 students participated in VBS 2025, and we had 32 volunteers. It was a wonderful 3 fun filled afternoons for our students and they learned to trust Jesus! A very special thank you to our Education Board, Pastors, Executive Team, Church Staff, Parents, Students and Volunteers for making this such an amazing VBS. We also thank the Endowment Committee for their financial support of VBS each year. On June 8th, VBS Celebration

August 2025 Tracy took time to organize and order curriculum, bibles and cleaning of the classrooms, then went to work finding volunteers for the upcoming Sunday school year. A total of 28 Sunday school teachers/ helpers and 3 substitute teachers were recruited to teach students this year. We continue to run monthly Children's Offerings for local causes. August children's noisy offering is for the ROOFDA

September 2025 Teacher Orientation was held Weds, September 6 at 12pm to allow teachers/helpers to come see their classrooms and have a brief orientation with Ms. Tracy before Sunday school begins, along with Jake showing them how to use the projectors that his family donated. Rally Sunday, first day of Sunday School was Sept 14th at 10am. 150 children participated in Rally Day! Orientation for new 3-year-old students and parents was also held that morning. Children's Offering for September was a noisy offering for the BP Youth Club to purchase supplies from their wish list.

October 2025 October is Pastor Appreciation Month. The students made and decorated cards and coloring pages and gifted them to Pastor Laurel and to Pastor Heidi to show our appreciation of all they do for us and our Education Program here at FLC. Kindergarten Bible Milestone was October 12th. Kindergarten students received their Spark! Story time Bibles in worship with their parents. We also had a Bible Milestone Celebration with Kindergarten families after worship in the Fireside room with had a snack, group picture, and we personalized our new Bibles together. Our Children's Offering for October was a Noisy offering for the city park.

November 2025 Lots of planning and classroom practice for the Christmas program gets going this month! 3 yo-4th grade students sang during worship November 23. November 30th is when our Advent Festival took place at 10am. All ages and families were welcome for a fun morning of songs, cookies, games and crafts. We had several Confirmation students help us with this event, along with parent volunteers and the Ed Board and are grateful to all who help put this on. We had around 15 families attending. The snowstorm the day before made travel difficult for families. November Children's Offering was a Noisy Offering for Local Wish Tree Presents.

December 2025 The 2025 Christmas Program - "Go Tell it on the Mountain" was held December 14th at 11am, with a full sanctuary of parents, family and friends attending. We had 130 children participate, and they did a beautiful job of leading worship and telling us the story of the day Jesus was born. A very special thank you to our director-Melissa Stoen, music director – Megan Lynch. Our Sunday School teachers and helpers did an amazing job leading and assisting our children, as did our Ed Board, and many parent volunteers that even stepped in on the day-of in needed areas. Thank you to Matt Madsen and family for the setup and teardown. It was a team effort, and such a joy to be a part of the ministry that happened that day. The December Children's Offering was instant oatmeal packets for BP Backpack Program.

Yes, the church is also seeing the same increases as individual households, which means we need to see increased giving to keep up with the bills.

Takeaway: There is Vitality, a culture of gratitude and appreciation, and a variety of ways to give online and in-person. Barriers to giving in our congregation are few, but the message must be continually communicated and calibrated (updating Vanco giving info, and acknowledging the radio audience. For example: positive reminders of mission, coupled with clear requests for action, are successful.

Recap of our main goals: Two main asks were the focus of this years Build Us Up

First: Sign up on Vanco for a consistent, secure, and easy way to give weekly, bi-weekly, monthly, or a one time gift. This keeps the incoming offering consistent, especially during the summer.

Second: Consider increasing your weekly giving by \$5 or 5%. Current Vanco givers can go back into Vanco to increase their giving, as many may not have made changes since they signed up.

First Lutheran Church is also able to have daily adds on KOWZ 100.9 thanks to some who were able to donate for the special project. The ads are thankful for our members and our listeners we have not met. We want listeners to know they are welcome at our church any time. A small challenge was given to our listeners to send a dollar if they like what they are hearing in our ministry. There are 29K listeners. These ads will run daily for six months and we will look at the results then.

First Lutheran Church is thankful for its members and listeners on radio and Facebook. The outreach is great in getting the message of God to all who want to attend church or tune in on the radio and Facebook.

Year-End Annual Report for 2025

The First Lutheran Church Women are committed to grow in faith, affirm our gifts, support one another and serve our church and community. We help support and provide services for mission action projects throughout the year.

Bible study is held monthly on the third Wednesday of the month at nine thirty am. All women of the church are invited. The bible study is led by a member of the group and the study comes from the WELCA magazine Gather. Coffee and snacks are provided and items of interest are discussed during coffee time. The meeting usually ends around 10:30.

Delivering meals for SEMCAC continued throughout the year during the months of February, July and December. This is an ongoing commitment of the First Lutheran Church and deeply appreciated by both the recipients and SEMCAC. Many thanks to all those willing to deliver meals. If asked to assist in this important outreach, please consider being a volunteer.

Quilting resumed in January and continued every Monday until Palm Sunday when they were dedicated. Quilts were made for the Education Foundation and for sale in the Craft shop during the Lutefisk dinner. During 2025 202 quilts were made. Donated pillow cases were given to homeless shelters or Community Pathways. Sheets and blankets that were unsuitable for making quilts were also donated to Community Pathways. Thanks to all those who donated sheets and fabric. Help assembling quilts is always welcome. No sewing experience is needed.

Pillow cleaning took place in April. It will be planned for 2026 as well. Feather and down pillows can have additional fill added in addition to the usual cleaning and new covers.

The Marie Sanvik Center in Minneapolis has been supported by the women of FLC for many years. The center is a faith based inner city shelter providing food, clothing and Christian Care including summer programs for children. The center has changed direction from providing immediate needs other than daily noontime meals to that of providing job training for youth, weekly kids club and summer camps. Gospel ministry continues on a weekly basis. We will no longer collect items for the Marie Sanvik center unless we hear of a need.

The Lutefisk dinner held on a Saturday in October was a great success. Disbursement decisions were made in December. As in the past, the entire proceeds are donated to various organizations. Financial details are included in the finance report.

A coat drive in November resulted in 63 coats and jackets, vests and snow pants as well as a large bag of hats and mittens and a bag of socks. All of these were delivered to Community Pathways and were very welcome. Thanks to all who donated items.

The Women have supported the radio ministry for many years and during 2026 have committed additional support.

The women provided Sunday morning coffee on several occasions to raise money for various needs.

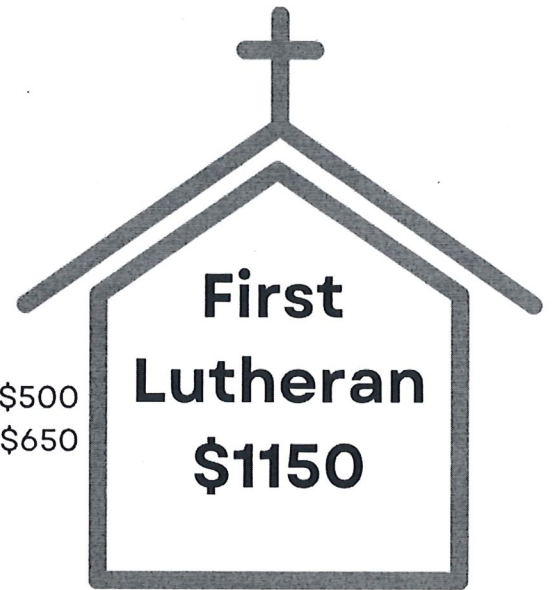

The Worship and Music Committee will meet next on January 13th, 2026 at 11am.

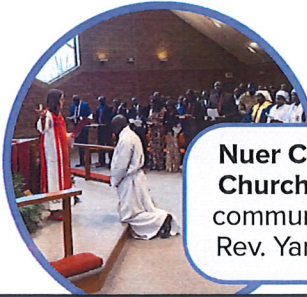

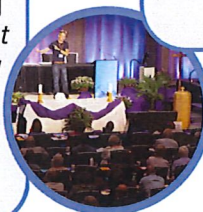


Rev. Sarah Krolak was called to serve as pastor of **Connections Ministry/Shelter Church**, which is a Synod Authorized Outreach Ministry based in Mankato.



Synod members participated in the **Lutheran Church of Colombia's National Assembly** where Rev. John Rojas was elected as bishop.

We gathered under the theme "*Remember what God has done. Prepare for what God will do.*" at the **Synod Assembly**. Three resolutions were passed regarding *Support for the Least of These and the Ministries that Serve Them* and *Expanded Preaching and Teaching on the Stories of Women in the Bible and Use of Female Imagery of God and of God's Work in the World*. On the first ballot, Bishop Hassanally was elected to a second six-year term.



About 140 ministry leaders attended the **Fall Theological Retreat**, which includes fellowship, education, and retreat. Rev. Leila Ortiz led the presentations and discussion on pneumatological estuaries, with the theme of Baptism in Muddy Waters.

2025 Annual Abbreviated Report to Congregations

Good Earth Village gratefully acknowledges the many faithful investments from our congregational members and partners. From your financial contributions to volunteer hours to providing program leadership to hosting our staff to your prayers and other service, **you all make the Village.**

FINANCES

The total budget for Good Earth Village in 2025 was \$1,366,756. Over 59% of annual financial needs are met by donations from individuals, congregations, WELCA groups, conferences, and businesses. Congregational and WELCA giving comprised 10% of our total gifts received for the year.

Good Earth Village gratefully acknowledges congregational financial support that was offered in monthly, annual, and special gifts/grants.

- **71 congregations** made a financial, missional investment in this outdoor ministry through unrestricted donations, event sponsorships, and grants totaling \$75,175. This is a decrease in participation of 7%, and a reduction in funds of 20% from 2024.
- **38 WELCA partners** made combined contributions of \$9,289. This is a 19% decrease in participation and an 25% decrease in funds.
- **29 congregations** held retreats at Good Earth Village. This is an increase of 26%!

PROGRAMMING Highlights

Summer Camp 2025

1. Twenty young adult leaders, including six international staff from Colombia (3), England (1), Ireland (1), Mexico (1).
2. We served 598 campers onsite representing 104 congregations.
3. We provided 7 off-site day camps at congregations.
4. The Good Earth Village endowment covered the cost of four high school students in the staff-in-training program.
5. Provided financial assistance to 80% of campers in campership and discounts.
6. A curriculum committee was assembled with pastors from six congregations.

Lunch and Learn Series

We offered seven programs in 2025 that included themes of nature, mental health, grief, race, and music.

Women's Day

We moved our annual Women's Day program to March from June to coincide with International Women's Month. The topic was "Crafting Wellness" and it was led by Juli Johnson of Iowa City, Iowa. Fifteen congregations were represented by 29 women. The program was a "mini camp experience" with devotions, presentations about different types of wellness, activities, and (naturally) food.
